Karen's Column

In this, my last column, I want to say that it has been an honor and a pleasure to serve as your Township Supervisor during the past four years. It gave me an opportunity to learn more about our township, work with a great staff, and meet many of you whom I otherwise would not have known. Also, in this column, I would like to remind you of some of the continuing and new services offered by Maine Township and to add a few words about our efforts to keep taxes low. Please read to make sure you are taking advantage of all the Township has to offer:

MaineStay

This year, our MaineStay Department celebrated its 50th anniversary of providing high-quality mental health services and programs for at-risk youth. During the past few years, Mainestay has expanded to provide sessions at five different locations, including at four local schools. This year MaineStay also began 11 new programs for children and families.

Food Pantry

Our food pantry ensures that all Maine Township residents have access to plenty of fresh, nutritious and healthy food. This year the Food Pantry has greatly expanded the amount of food it takes in and the number of families it serves. It now has 800 -1000 family visits to the pantry per month, and it prepares bags of food every week for School District 63 children who may be food insecure over the weekend.

Transportation Program

New this year is our Lift Van ("Van Go"), which provides seniors and disabled residents with free rides to medical appointments and to some Mainstreamer events. Call for a ride if you need one: (847) 297-2510.

MaineStreamers

This past year, for the first time, our Senior Department provided free vision and hearing tests and free informative lectures. And, as in the past, they organized fitness classes and combatted isolation by offering innumerable programs for seniors throughout the year.

General Assistance

General Assistance supports the health of residents by signing them up for many benefits such as the LIHEAP program which helps them pay their utility bills. Last year, I raised the monthly general assistance benefit for qualifying residents, which had not been raised in 6 years.

Office of Emergency Management

The goal of this office is to create a disasterresistant community. The office issues weather alerts, works with other first responders during a crisis, and enlists volunteers and part-time employees to help with traffic and crowd control at large events.

Recovery Connection

Recovery Connection continues to hold Friday night meetings for residents battling addiction problems, and it hosts sober golf, sober yoga, and a number of other events throughout the community to build sober fellowship, educate and save lives. This year we added a part-time staff member to assist in this work.

Code Enforcement

This Department enforces our Codes to maintain our community's appearance and property values. A couple of years ago, we placed our Code on-line, so you can easily find its provisions.

Maintenance Department

While this Department's primary function is to maintain our building, I have also imposed upon its members to help us host a trio of summer events – Paper Shredding, Electronics Recycling, and Dumpster Days - plus Holiday Lights Recycling in January. Their efforts have helped our residents clean house and recycle unneeded household materials.

Township Clerk Peter Gialamas - The Clerk's Office has continued to provide many services such as issuing passports and selling various types of licenses, but they also recently expanded their hours to accommodate residents who work from 9 to 5.

Township Assessor Susan Moylan Krey -

This past year, our Assessor's Office processed over 2000 exemption requests, both current and past, including Homeowner, Senior Freeze, Veterans', and Disabled Persons' Exemptions, helping eligible residents receive the tax relief they deserve. The office also assisted over 14,000 Maine Township residents with their questions

and concerns, providing guidance on property tax matters.

Highway Commissioner Ed Beauvais

- the Highway Department continues to maintain our roads by removing snow and making repairs. This past year, Ed also held a Toys for Tots collection and a Pollinator Giveaway.

Other Health, Safety and Fun Programs

Over the past year, we hosted many other events which contributed to residents' health, such as immunization clinics, pet immunizations clinics, blood drives, and the 2024 Health Fair. We also helped you stay safe and avoid being a crime victim with our Neighborhood Watch Meetings with the sheriff's police and firefighters, a free Catalytic Converter painting event to discourage thefts, the Niles Maine Public Library's seminars on spam, cybersecurity, and media literacy, and the North Suburban Legal Aid Clinic on Renters' Rights. Plus, we also gave residents events to gather at and enjoy such as the Halloween Trunk or Treat fest and the Turkey Give-Away.

Keeping Taxes Low

I am pleased to say that the board did not raise the levy rate this year, but the Township was still able to expand services through grants, donations, and cost-saving measures.

In terms of raising money, our Community Garage Sale, raised about \$5000 to support MaineStay's Summer Camp program. MaineStay also received a grant for in-school counseling, Recovery Connection received a grant to expand its services, while I applied for and received a grant for our food pantry.

Tax dollars were not needed to buy any food for our food pantry as all was provided by

the Greater Chicago Food Depository, regular donations from local restaurants, grocery stores, corporations, and individuals who donated food and/or money. And for the past couple of years, we have raised some food in our very own garden! In addition, about 60 volunteers cumulatively provide about 600 hours of service a month without any compensation—thus saving taxpayers from having to hire additional staff.

Finally, we recently began investing in the Illinois Fund, where we are able to earn a higher rate of interest than available in banks, thus making our saved dollars work hard for you, the taxpayer.

In conclusion, I wish Maine Township the best and look forward to seeing you all at upcoming Township events. •

2025 Maine Township Reassessment Update

As of March 31, 2025, I have not been informed of the mailing date for Maine Township Reassessment Notices. The Cook County Assessor has indicated that they will be sent out sometime this summer. I will post the appeal dates on the Maine Township website as soon as I receive confirmation of the reassessment mailing and appeal period.

What is an Assessment Appeal?

An assessment appeal is a request to lower a property's assessed valuation by demonstrating that the assessment is unfair or inaccurate. A successful appeal can reduce a property owner's share of the local tax burden.

How to File an Appeal

We will assist residents in filing appeals once reassessment notices are mailed. The best way to initiate an appeal is by downloading and completing the Maine Township In-Take Appeal Request Form. This form will be available on the Maine Township website only when we are open for appeals.

If you are unable to complete the form, you may call us at 224-257-4830. Please leave a message with the following details:

- Name
- Address
- Telephone Number
- Property Index Number (PIN)
- Email Address
- Brief Description of Your Request

Please do not call more than once. Due to the high volume of calls, we cannot return all calls immediately, and repeat requests will slow down the process.

Grounds for an Assessment Appeal

- 1. Lack of Uniformity Similar properties (in terms of square footage, age, and construction) within the same neighborhood and property class are assessed at a lower valuation.
- 2. Overvaluation If you recently purchased a home in an armslength (open market) sale and the purchase price is lower than your current Estimated Market Value, or if you have had an appraisal, you may file an appeal. Supporting documentation such as:
 - A Settlement Statement from a closing within the last three years
 - A USPAP-compliant appraisal within the last 18 months
- 3. Major Error in Property Description If your property has incorrect information that significantly impacts its market value, such as inaccurate square footage or classification, you should file an appeal. However, minor errors (e.g., number of bedrooms or bathrooms) may not necessarily indicate an incorrect assessment.

Permit & Waiver Letter Requests – Not sure if your project requires a permit or Waiver Letter from the highway department? The quickest way to find out is to go to the township's website mainetown.com search for Highway Department, click on Permit where you may print out our one-page user friendly Project Review Form. Then all you need to do is email completed form to highway@mainetown.com and we will be happy to guide you through the process.

Also, if you would like to report any issues or concerns to the highway department, please go to township website mainetown.com print out our **Resident Request Form**, complete and return to highway@mainetown.com for quickest response.

The annual **Tree Branch Pickup Program** (third Monday of the month) starts on April 21st, and continues May 19th, June 16th, July 21st, August 18th, ending September 15th for the season. For your convenience, you may download our 2025 Calendar with Tree Branch Pickup dates noted, at our website mainetown.com highway department tab. Please make yourself familiar with our guidelines for branch pickup. Residents who place unauthorized items in your tree branch pile, may be passed up for pickup.

Please be aware that our highway crew wears earplugs and protective face gear when operating the tree branch chipper. 
