It's hard to imagine that we're on the threshold of the new year 2026; but the shorter days and cooler nights are stark reminders that winter and the holiday season is drawing near. It can be sad to say goodbye to another year; however, it gives us an opportunity to recap all of the wonderful things that have happened along the way.

Maine Township for instance, has been a bee hive of activity. We are abuzz with all our programs and services. Over the past year our Food Pantry had 9,813 visits and served 18,233 individuals. Our grocery shopping experience is really appreciated by our visitors.

Our Clerk's office processed 1,558 passport applications, issued 197 license plate stickers and in total, including the many other services the Clerk's office offers, served more than 1.297 residents.

Our Assessor's office served 15,300 residents between calls and in-person visits. They are always happy to assist with property tax appeals or any other related issues.

Our MaineStay department, guided by their award-winning Director Richard Lyon worked with 117 therapy participants, 380 youth program participants, 107 clinical group participants and brought in a whopping 535 community program participants. Luckily the rain abated and our annual garage sale was a hit once again! I'd be remiss if I didn't mention our annual Trunk or Treat event where 600 costumed children walked through our parking lot collecting candy and prizes and were delighted by the decorated trunks.

Federal Government impacts are leading to a significant increase in Pantry visits and your in-kind, financial and time donations are greatly appreciated. The late Fall is the time of year when we look back upon our accomplishments over the past year and plan and prepare for the accomplishments yet to come. I wish to take this opportunity to commend our

food pantry which continues to deliver giant results with limited assets. Utilizing a team approach which includes a very limited staff of only 2-3 township employees along with over 100 volunteers working only 8 hours per week, our food pantry under the leadership of its Director Mike Pitzaferro is now delivering an astounding 50 boxes of food and other essential living supplies per day to the needy persons of our community. I cannot think of a greater tribute to our primary statutory mission of helping the indigent people of our community in these austere times.

I also wish to commend our Recovery Connection team. Also working with a limited staff and under the leadership of Marty Cook, over 75 boxes of Narcan were recently delivered over a short period of time in the continuing battle against opioid addiction and overdose. I continue to be impressed by the inspiring stories of men and women like local musician Terry Byrne who sought the help of others to overcome addiction to successfully change the course of their lives.

I also wish to congratulate our own award winners. Sam "Faris" Dababneh was the recipient of Public Service Award of Excellence from Niles Night of Roses for his work in the Assessor's Office. MaineStay Youth and Family Services Director Richard Lyon received the 2025 AITCOY Director of the Year award at the Township Officials of Illinois Conference. The achievements and awards which our Maine Township employees have received in the past and continue to receive bring acclaim and prestige to all of us.

### **Community Garage Sale**

The 19th annual Maine Township Community Garage Sale fundraiser was held on September 13. A total of \$5,244 in net revenue was raised and has been allocated to support our summer camp for at-risk youth. 

# It's Finally Official: The Senior Freeze Income Threshold Is Increasing to \$75,000 in Tax Year 2026

We are pleased to share exciting news for Maine Township senior homeowners! Lawmakers have officially approved an increase in the **Senior Freeze** income threshold.

- Current threshold: \$65,000 (remains in effect for the 2025 Tax Year)
- New threshold: \$75,000 for Tax Year 2026 (reflected on 2027 tax bills)
- Future increases: \$77,000 in 2028 and \$79,000 in 2029

This is wonderful news for many of our senior residents who are working hard to stay in their homes amid rising property taxes and living costs. For further information, see SB 0642 35 ILCS 200/15-172.





# 2025 First Installment Due Date Moved to April 1, 2026

Due to delays in issuing the 2024 second installment property tax bills, new legislation has moved the **2025 first installment due date** to **April 1, 2026**—one month later than usual.

This adjustment will provide taxpayers with additional time between bill payments.

# Understanding the Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program

The Senior Citizen Real Estate Tax Deferral Program is another valuable form of tax relief available to qualified seniors. This program works like a low-interest loan from the State of Illinois, allowing eligible homeowners to defer up to \$7,500 per tax year (including both installments) on their primary residence.

The deferred amount, plus interest, is repaid when the property is sold or upon the participant's passing.

Legislative changes have also increased the **income eligibility** for this program—currently set at \$65,000—to align with the new **Senior Freeze** income thresholds in the coming years.

### **Agency Partner Spotlight: PEER Services**

This year, **PEER Services** marked five decades of serving the public with a steadfast mission: to reduce the harms of substance use, addiction, and stigma by engaging youth and adults with prevention programming and evidence-based treatment. Founded in 1975 by a coalition of community leaders responding to rising substance-use concerns, PEER Services began as a community-based nonprofit focused on prevention and treatment in the Evanston area. Since then, it has grown significantly, expanding services throughout North and Northwest Cook County, including Maine Township.

In addition to outpatient treatment for teens and adults, PEER Services collaborates with many local schools, hospitals, justice-system partners, and community organizations to deliver services including community-based prevention education, early-intervention programs, medication-assisted recovery (MAR), counseling, and family support. Last year, the agency reached more than 20,000 young people and families through



its prevention efforts, and directly served approximately 725 clients in treatment programs, 90% of whom came from low-income backgrounds. Importantly, the organization provides services to anyone in need, regardless of ability to pay.

In a time when substance-use disorders—including opioid and alcohol misuse—remain critical public-health issues, agencies like PEER Services play a vital role in prevention, recovery, and community resilience. By combining evidence-based treatment, early intervention, community-based prevention efforts, and equitable access, the work done by PEER Services can be felt across families and communities. As one client put it: "Not only did PEER Services save my life, they made it a life worth saving."

# HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT NEWS

Greetings Maine Township Residents – Winter is not officially here until December 21, 2025, but cold weather is always

prevalent during this time of the year. According to weather fore-casters, the Midwest region is expected to experience a colder and snowier winter season in 2025/2026. Now is the time to make your preparations for winter. If you have a contractor who plows your driveway and shovels your sidewalks, do not forget to have them also shovel a path to your mailbox. If you are elderly, ask your family, friends, or neighbors to assist you in getting your mail if your mailbox is at the curb.

# **UPDATE - 2025 Maine Township Highway Department Bike and Sidewalk Project:**

While many of you have finished up on your outside projects before the winter, the Highway Department also buttoned up on our 2025 Bike Lane and Sidewalk Project on Church Street and Western Avenue. We applied for and obtained monies from Cook County's Invest in Cook County Grant Program to partially fund this project. Utilizing these types of grant funds is a great way to keep taxpayers' costs down while improving our streets, sidewalks, and gutters, as well as adding bike lanes and improving the safety of pedestrians and our roadways.

Once finished, this project will make it easier and safer to travel between the unincorporated area, the Village of Niles to the east, the City of Des Plaines and Cook County Forest Preserve to the west, and the City of Park Ridge in between. In addition to the bike lane, pedestrians will now have a safe path to walk along Church Street and Western Avenue. There will also be a new pedestrian signal installed at the corner of Greenwood and Church for safer passage across Greenwood Avenue.
